WHAT DOES IT MEAN?

"Cursillo" (pronounced "kur-SEE-yo") is a Spanish word meaning "little course." Specifically, it refers to a short course in Christian living. The Cursillo Movement is made up of individuals who have participated in such a short course by attending a Cursillo weekend and who endeavor to apply Christian principles in their daily lives.

WHAT IS ITS ORIGIN?

The Cursillo Movement was started in 1947 by the Bishop of Majorca, and has now spread to every continent. It is Roman Catholic in its origins, and bears the approval of the Pope and the Council of the American Bishops.

CURSILLO'S PURPOSE?

The Cursillo is designed to help practicing Christians:

- **4** Renew and strengthen their love of Jesus.
- 4 Grow in faith, knowledge, and personal holiness.
- Here and the second sec environments and people with whom they come into contact and make those values the pattern for their own lives.

WHAT IS "THE CURSILLO WEEKEND"?

The three-day weekend opens on Thursday evening and closes on Sunday evening. A group of about twenty people listen to a series of coordinated talks presented by a team of laypersons and clergy. The weekend provides opportunities for -

- Daily Eucharist
- The Sacrament of Reconciliation
- Prayer and Introspection
- Sharing of Experiences
- Spiritual Counseling Fun!

The Cursillo Weekend is not a silent retreat. Weekends are planned for men and women separately. In our area, one women's and one men's weekend is held each year.

WHO SHOULD ATTEND?

The Cursillo Weekend is for adult practicing Catholics from all walks of life. The weekend is not recommended for people who are currently undergoing an emotional or family crisis, since the Cursillo Weekend team is not professionally trained to fully meet such needs. WHAT HAPPENS AFTER THE WEEKEND?

Cursillistas (those who have made a Cursillo weekend) are encouraged to continue the weekend experience. This is accomplished by meeting regularly with a small group of friends —a Group Reunion— to share with one another their progress in Christian living. Larger group gatherings, called Ultreyas (another Spanish word, meaning "progress"), are held at area parishes monthly for the spiritual and social enrichment of the entire Cursillo community. Those who attend Group Reunion and Ultreya consider it a joy rather than an obligation. These gatherings facilitate both giving and receiving of support in the effort to make the world more reflective of Christ's love.

WHO RUNS THE MOVEMENT?

Although there is a single national Cursillo Organization, the movement operates primarily at the diocesan and regional level. These local groups:

- Coordinate activities
- Provide training for team members
- Plan the weekends
- Arrange the physical facilities, etc.

The Cursillo is completely staffed by volunteers, and there are no dues or assessments for individual Cursillistas.

THERE ARE MANY REASONS PEOPLE GO ON A CURSILLO WEEKEND.

IS CURSILLO FOR YOU?

Yes, if you want to deepen and enrich your spiritual life.

Yes, if you want fresh information about the Church and your role in it. Yes, if you are looking for new meaning and direction in your life. Yes, if you want to move closer in your relationship with Jesus.

Yes, if you hope to be a more effective Christian leader.



HOW DO I GET INVOLVED WITH CURSILLO?

People interested in learning more about Cursillo are encouraged to contact local Cursillistas at the parish or community level. Birmingham Diocese Cursillo has designated Cursillo Liaisons in many areas of the diocese. Their names and contact information are available on our website. Because Cursillo relies heavily on the concepts of community and mutual support, attendance at a weekend is normally the result of friendships established at the parish level. Since weekends fill up quickly, an application process is used and a "sponsor" helps each applicant with the application. The charge for the weekend is just \$250.00 per person for participants and team members. After the weekend, a request for donations is made to help cover accommodations and food for future attendees. Donations are requested, but not required.
